## Brendan's time at the Sports Festival (Sports Day)

Last month, Keika Commercial held its Sports Festival. The Sports Festival is a major event for high schools in Japan, so I was looking forward to seeing what it would be like. In Australia, high schools hold something similar called an 'athletics carnival', but only students in the track and field club will take part.

The trip to Urawa Playing Field was an adventure in itself. After walking a short way from the train station, the buildings became smaller and it felt like I was in the countryside.
