


After listening to the speeches, I have collected a few statistics that you might find interesting. Read on to see what animals the students consider to be their dream pet!



Most popular types of animals:


Mammals (for example, rabbits, hedgehogs and hamsters) were the most popular type of animal to have as a pet. It seems like a lot of students wanted a warm animal that you can hold.

Reptiles	13	1	14
Sea animals	9	4	13
Birds	4	5	9

Big and Small

The biggest animal chosen as a pet was a whale. You're going to need a big tank! The smallest was the microscopic tardigrade ($\mathcal{P} \triangleleft \mathcal{L} \triangleright$).
